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Bunuru Season of Adolescence

February - March



The Noongar Season 'Bunuru' is represented by the colour orange and is the hottest time of the year.

With little to no rain and hot easterly and northerly winds followed by a cooling afternoon sea breeze for areas close to the coast. Freshwater foods and seafood made up much of the traditional Noongar people's diet during Bunuru, along with fruits of the zamia (toxins removed), wattle seeds, banksia blossoms and various roots. A sweet drink was often made by soaking blossoms from gum trees in water.

The fading of the moodjar (Nuytsia floribunda - pictured) and the blossoming of the marri would signal the start of the hot Bunuru weather. The female zamia also begins to produce huge cones from its centre which slowly change to bright red, indicating they're ripening and becoming more attractive to animals, particularly emus, that will eat the toxic outer layer.

Now is also a good time to help out native insects, birds and animals by putting out additional water in your garden. Just make sure the dishes aren't too deep and there is a means of escape for smaller animals if they fall in, like a rock or stick.

The Denmark Environment Centre created a beautiful video on the Bunuru season as seen from the Wilson Inlet. In the film Averil Dean and Lindsay Dean discuss the traditional food sources found on the inlet for traditional Noongar people living in the



West Cape Howe NP- Camera Maintenance and Image Retrieval



The Torbay Catchment Group has a camera array set up in West Cape Howe NP to monitor for ferals as part of our feral control measures and as an indicator of the program's success.

We have recently conducted camera maintenance and battery replacement and collected the images taken from the cameras and thought we would share some of the images. We are pleased to see a Western Ringtail possum, tiger snake and sparrowhawk all posing nicely for our cameras!

Climate Refugia Project Update





Since early last year TCG has been delivering a comprehensive cockatoo conservation program that extends across the catchment- from Redmond in the north, Lowlands and WCHNP in the west and Little Grove in the east. It includes fencing for remnant vegetation, revegetation, cockatoo monitoring and the installation of cockatubes.

We began our project with a workshop last year to build new cockatubes that had a wider diameter to better accommodate the large bird's tails. We garnered much advice and knowledge from black cockatoo expert Dr Sam Rycken from Birdlife Australia and we asked for your citizen science input on where cockatoos have been seen visiting and breeding in our area. Thanks to everyone who sent in a survey!

A huge amount of time and research has gone into searching for suitable locations to ensure a high chance of success and we have now installed nine new cockatubes in nearby properties.

The birds are clearly loving the new cockatubes as there has already been a successful breeding occur!

We have also been repurposing our older style cockatubes to much needed duckatubes and have been installing them where needed and next week we will be building possum and duck nestboxes in our workshop with Simon Cherriman. See below for booking information.

Importantly, these four marine areas will be managed as one interconnected ecological system.

Please have your say on the indicative management plans and proposed zoning. Your feedback is important, and all feedback will be considered. The marine park will not be created until the final management plans, including final boundaries and zoning schemes, are approved by the Ministers for Environment; Fisheries; and Mines and Petroleum.

 Sharing stories of coastal and marine rehabilitation and conservation success or challenge that are important to local communities



Every year, Birdlife Australia conducts The Great Cocky Count (GCC) which is a citizen-science survey, and the biggest single survey for black-cockatoos in Western Australia. In the lead-up to the GCC each year, they ask people to keep an eye out for

arrive in the evening. Records submitted from across south-western WA provide a snapshot of black-cockatoo populations, helping to quantify changes in their numbers.

Where can I take part in this survey?

The Great Cocky Count takes place in south-western Western Australia — south-west of a line between Geraldton and Esperance — on a single night in autumn. Citizen scientists can help in the lead-up to the GCC by locating night roosts (places where the black-cockatoos gather to sleep at night).
